So far, nine neighborhoods throughout the city have registered. Last week marked the first part of a seven-week academy aimed at fostering public interest in the effort.

"We don't have specific projects in mind — it could be parks, gardens, benches or maybe it's signage or decorative lighting to mark that specific neighborhood," Rehbein said.

The program has \$5,000 specifically aimed at low- to moderate-income areas as designated by the U.S. Census Bureau. Roughly one-third of Appleton's neighborhoods meet that requirement with 80 percent or lower of the median household income.

A matter of 'placemaking'

Dane said the program is all about "placemaking," a process of enhancing ☑ public spaces and engaging neighbors. It goes beyond the already-established Neighborhood Watch.

"The Watch is really more of a problem-driven initiative and addresses safety," Dane said. "We want to address all facets of a healthy and positive neighborhood."

He said placemaking could include community gardens, trails or simple

real changes to road designs that help with pedestrian traffic.

And then there are the often-discussed trains that rumble through swaths of city blocks at night.

"We know it won't get fixed overnight, but there have to be things we can do to mitigate the noise impacts of the trains," Dane said. "We seem to have a rotation of conductors and sometimes they really lay on the horn at night."
